FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT-MR. COLLINS

First, I want to take a moment to thank everyone for a great Fall and hope we can continue to make positive changes as we move forward. With the approach of winter I want to remind everyone about the possibility of school closings and delays. We will try to make the best decision for a majority of our students, however, if you feel it is too bad for your student to attend school that is a parent decision—and you can keep them at home. We will use our Alert Messaging system to get the word out as soon as possible after a decision is made. Typically, we also post on Lincoln TV Stations Channel 10/11 and Channel 8 and 99.5 FM on the radio. Today, these entities belong to broad messaging services that put the information out on a variety of member platforms as well so you might see closing information on other sites—even though we have not specifically contacted them.

The NSAA Winter sports season is nearly upon us and as I have stated in the past fans are close to the action. As a parent it took a good deal of self-discipline to model positive sportsmanship and behavior my children would be proud of. I was successful---most of the time. I want to remind everyone of some of the Fundamentals of Sportsmanship as paraphrased from the NSAA Sportsmanship Handbook.

1. Gain an Understanding and Appreciation for the Rules of the Contest. The necessity to be well informed is essential. Know the rules. If you are uninformed, refrain from expressing opinions on officials, coaches, or administrative decisions. The spirit of Good Sportsmanship depends on conformance to a rule's intent as well as to the letter of a given rule.

2. Exercise Representative Behavior at All Times. The true value of interscholastic competition relies upon everyone exhibiting behavior that is representative of a sound value base. Your behavior influences others whether you are aware of it or not.

3. Recognize and Appreciate Skilled Performances Regardless of Affiliation. Applause for an opponent's good performance displays generosity and represents Good Sportsmanship. This action also reflects a true awareness of the game by recognizing and acknowledging quality.

4. Exhibit Respect for the Officials. The officials of any contest are impartial arbitrators who are trained and who perform to the best of their ability. Mistakes by all those involved in the contests are a part of the game. We should not rationalize our own poor or unsuccessful performance or behavior by placing responsibility on an official.

5. Display Openly a Respect for the Opponent at All Times. Opponents are guests and should be treated cordially, provided with the best accommodations, and accorded tolerance at all times. Be a positive representative for your school, team, or family.

6. Display Pride in Your Actions at Every Opportunity. Be a GREAT representative of Wilber-Clatonia by demonstrating positive, responsible support for our students and programs.

Of note, Mrs. Loecker, Secondary Life Sciences instructor will not be with us for the second semester. We are actively seeking a replacement and evaluating options to fill this need. There is a teacher shortage in Nebraska and across the nation. Science has been shortage area for some time so finding a way to adequately fill this need will be a challenge. If you know of someone with a Sciences background that would be interested in filling a semester position please reach out to either the Superintendent's office or the High School Principal's office. We would appreciate any leads you may have.

Finally, Congratulations to Tim Riechers on being re-elected to the Board of Education and to Lance Kuhlman and Chris Woerner on being elected to the Board of Education. All have been elected to 4-year terms.

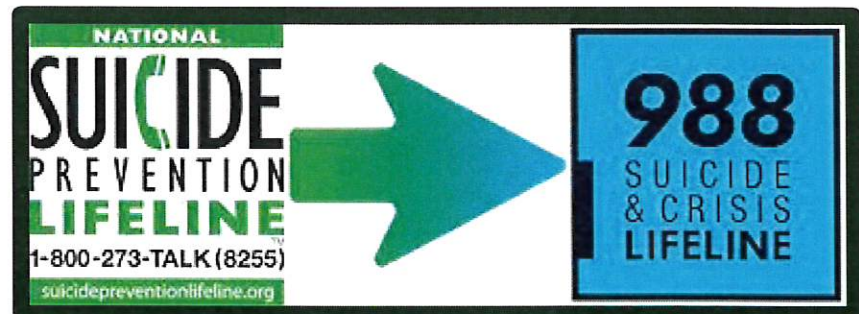
Congratulations to the Greater Omaha Council Bluffs Area Council on Youth Leadership Youth Salute Awardees!

SKILLS EVERY KID SHOULD MASTER TO BE SELF-SUFFICIENT

AGES 2-3

SMALL CHORES AND BASIC GROOMING

This is the age when your child will start to learn basic life skills. By the age of three, your child should be able to:

- Help put toys away
- Dress themselves (with some help from you).
- Put clothes in the hamper after getting undressed
- Clear their plate after meals
- Help set the table
- Brush their teeth and wash their face (with assistance)

AGES 6-7

BASIC COOKING TECHNIQUES AND HOME CLEANING

Kids at this age can start to help with cooking meals, and can learn to:

- Mix, stir, and cut with a dull knife
- Make a basic meal, such as a sandwich
- Help put the groceries away
- Wash the dishes
- Use basic household cleaners safely
- Straighten up the bathroom after using it
- Make the bed without assistance
- Bathe unsupervised

AGES 10-13

GAINING INDEPENDENCE

Ten is about the age when your child can begin to perform many skills independently. Kids this age should know how to:

- Stay home alone
- Go to the store alone and make purchases
- Change bed sheets
- Use the washing machine and dryer
- Plan and prepare a meal with several ingredients
- Use the oven to broil or bake foods
- Read food and safety labels
- Know how to iron clothes
- Learn to use basic hand tools
- Mow the lawn
- Look after younger siblings or neighbors

AGES 4-5

IMPORTANT NAMES AND NUMBERS

When your child reaches this age, safety skills are high on the list. By four or five kids should know:

- Memorize their full name, address, and phone number
- Know how to make an emergency call
- How to do simple chores like dusting in easy-to-reach places
- How to feed the pets
- Understand the very basic concept of how money is used and identify basic coins and bills
- Choose their own clothes to wear
- Put their own clothes away

AGES 8-9

PRIDE IN PERSONAL BELONGINGS

By this time, your child should take pride in her personal belongings and take care of them properly. This includes being able to:

- Fold their clothes.
- Learn simple sewing skills
- Care for outdoor toys such as bikes or roller skates:
- Take care of personal hygiene without being told to do so
- Use a broom and dustpan properly
- Read a recipe and prepare a simple meal
- Help create a grocery list
- Count and make change
- Take written phone messages
- Help with simple lawn duties such as watering and weeding flower beds
- Take out the trash

AGES 14-18

PREPARING TO ENTER ADULTHOOD

During the teen years, your child should have a very good mastering of all of the previous skills. On top of that, she should also be able to:

- Change the vacuum cleaner bag,
- Clean the stove
- Unclog drains
- Fill a car with gas
- Add air to and change a tire
- Read and understand medicine labels and dosages
- Interview for and get a job

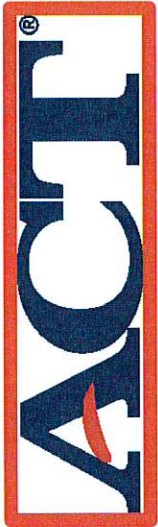

How to Improve Your Child's Mental Health (Part 2)

Build Trust

Your relationship with your kids plays a major role in their mental health, and a solid relationship begins with building trust. One way to establish trust is by creating a sense of safety and security. One way to establish trust is by creating a sense of safety and security.

This means meeting your child's physical and emotional needs by taking care of them when they're hungry, thirsty, hot, or cold, as well as when they're scared, anxious, or sad.

And by all means, do what you say and say what you mean. Your kids need you to be consistent, honest, and caring. Find ways to demonstrate that you love them and that they can trust you to keep them safe and healthy.

Foster Healthy Relationships

The relationship kids have with their parents is vital, but it's not the only relationship that matters. A mentally healthy child will have a number of relationships with other family members, such as grandparents and cousins, as well as with friends and neighbors.

Even if you're the type of parent who loves to spend along time with your little ones, give them the opportunity to connect with other people too-especially their best friends. Maintaining these relationships can make all the difference in the world to your child's mental health.

If you live far away from loved ones, get creative and do what you can to encourage your kids to connect with them. Arrange a virtual visit with grandparents or encourage kids to use Skype or FaceTime to connect with friends who don't live nearby. Although virtual interactions are less than ideal, they still help kids maintain their relationships with others.

Be Consistent

The importance of being consistent can't be overstated. Children crave predictability and structure. They want to know what activity they're going to do next, what consequences they will experience if they break rules, and what privileges they will receive for good behavior.

Things like moving to a new city or experiencing divorce can create chaos and big changes that are hard on kids. It's common for them to withdraw, grow anxious, or begin acting out when they're struggling to deal with their feelings. Maintaining consistent discipline and ensuring your kids know what to expect day to day will help them manage their emotions.

Likewise, help them prepare for new school years and other transitions by providing structure in their everyday lives. Establish a daily routine, keep a calendar, and plan a fun day for the family each week.

WILBER LAKE AND ARBORETUM

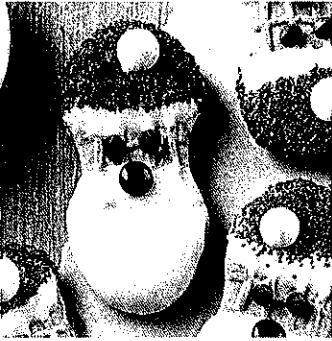

Taste of Home

Santa Claus Cookies

TOTAL TIME: Prep: 40 min. + standing Cook: 5 min.

YIELD: 32 cookies.

Store-bought peanut butter sandwich cookies become jolly Santas with white chocolate, colored sugar, mini chips and red-hot candies. —Mary Kaufenberg, Shakopee, Minnesota

Ingredients

12 ounces white baking chocolate, chopped

1 package (1 pound) Nutter Butter sandwich cookies

Red colored sugar

32 vanilla or white chips

64 miniature semisweet chocolate chips

32 Red Hots candies

Directions

1. In a microwave, melt white chocolate at 70% power for 1 minute; stir. Microwave at additional 10- to 20-second intervals, stirring until smooth.

2. Dip one end of each cookie into melted chocolate, allowing excess to drip off. Place on wire racks. For Santa's hat, sprinkle red sugar on top part of chocolate. Press one vanilla chip off-center on hat for pom-pom; let stand until set.

3. Dip other end of each cookie into melted chocolate for beard, leaving center of cookie uncovered. Place on wire racks. With a dab of melted chocolate, attach semisweet chips for eyes and a Red Hot for nose. Place on waxed paper until set.

On the last day of the year, my first graders gave me beautiful handwritten letters. As I read them aloud, my emotions got the better of me, and I started to choke up.

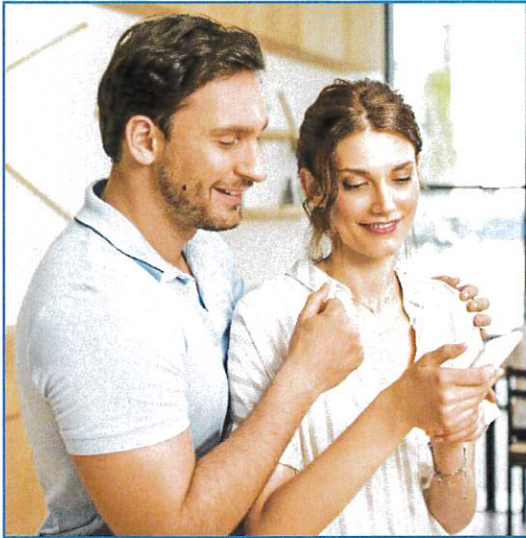
"I'm sorry," I said. "I'm having a hard time reading."

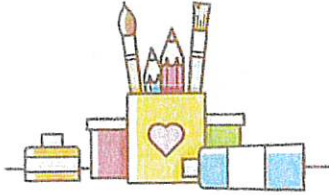
