FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT-MR. COLLINS

January is School Board Appreciation month across the Nation. The week of January 23-29 was Nebraska School Board Appreciation week. I want to take this opportunity to say thank you to the Wilber Clatonia Board members: Tim Riechers, President; Chris Cervený, Vice President; Brad Kalkwarf, Treasurer; Russ Schuerman, Secretary; Lance Kuhlmann, member; and Chris Woerner, member. American School Boards are an institution that help make public schools flexible, responsible and accountable to the needs of local communities as well as keeping alive the American ideal of representative government. Board members serve as trustees of our youth and I ask you to take a moment to thank the above mentioned individuals for their contributions in supporting us in the mission of helping Wilber Clatonia students be the best people they can be.

In February the staff will take a day to be in session without students to review a variety of assessment and behavioral data and come to consensus on some specific school improvement goals in the area of academics. As I review the various pieces of data I have noted some inconsistencies in "State reported" scores and those scores we use to aide in local decision making from National Assessments. Area colleagues have noted the same. Generally, students are being reported at a lower proficiency level on the State test then on the National tests. We have some students who have scored in the 80th percentile or higher (score as well or better than 80% of the students taking the test) however score lower and sometimes much lower are considered making progress on the State test. I do believe our overall results indicate a need to continue to work on reading comprehension and math. The staff has noted a need to improve writing proficiency as well. We are also in the process of reviewing Language Arts (Reading, writing grammar, etc.) curriculum and are reviewing high quality instructions materials for Language Arts. The goal is to use high quality curriculum materials coupled with appropriate instruction to have a positive impact on student achievement. This is difficult work that takes time but our intent is to help students to be better prepared.

There are always numerous student activities occurring during the winter months. This year is no different. We have several speech team students competing and placing in events, the FFA had all students receive a purple ribbon (top 10%) and some State qualifiers in District Leadership events and we have a student who has been selected to play in an honor concert at Carnegie Hall. There are many other achievements occurring with our students. We have a lot to be proud of. Thank you to the students for their efforts and to the parents for continued support. Proud to be a Wolverine!

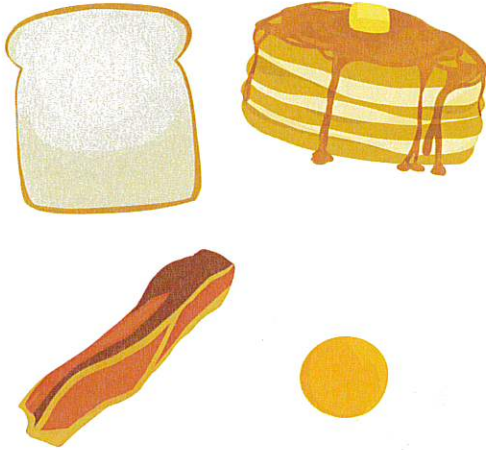

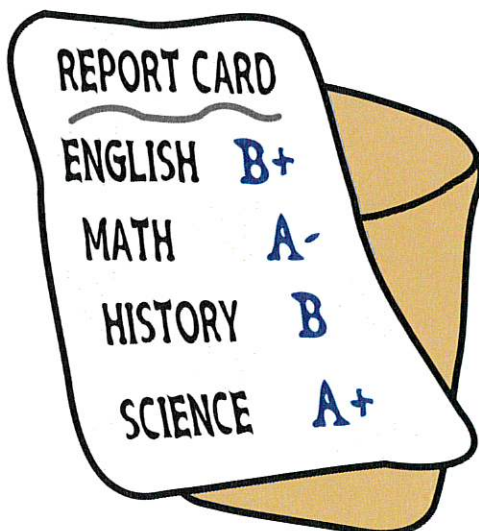


Secondary Changes and Announcements

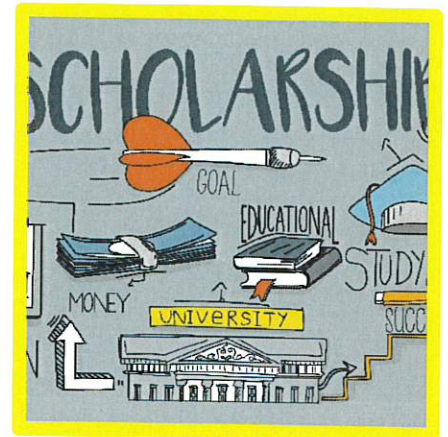

TCBY Donates Gifts

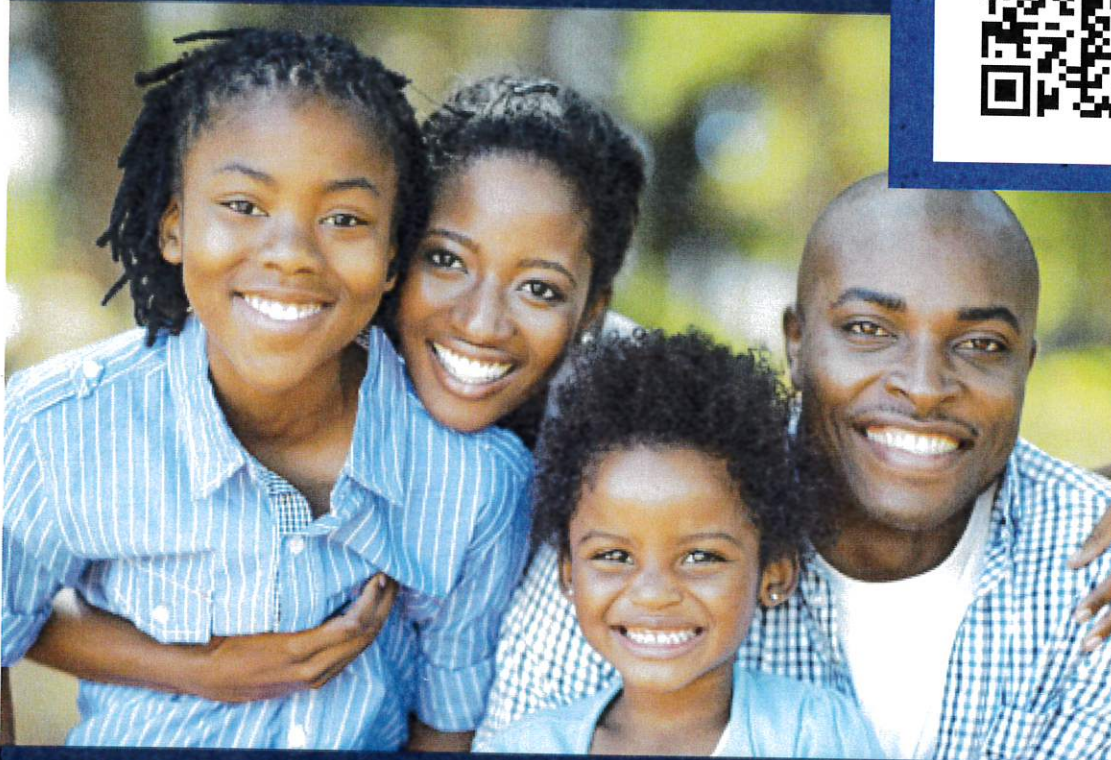

How to Add and Manage Your Students

- Our goal is to keep this process as simple as possible for you, the parent. Unless another parent has already done so, follow these steps:
1. **Add Student** - Fill out some basic information about your student. Your student will be visible to school administrators and you will always be able to see them in this list.
 2. **Update Forms** - Read through and complete the required forms.
 3. **Pay Fees** - Pay any registration/participation fees.
 4. Your school administration will review your registration and email your student or provide further instructions.
- Once Enrolled**
5. **Add Sports/Activities** - If your student is considering participating in a sport, we strongly encourage you to select that sport and complete the sports forms as well (just to be safe. (Skip this step if your child is not a student-athlete.))
 6. **School Forms** - Read through and complete any additional school or athletic forms. (If student signatures are required, your student will automatically be prompted to sign in and sign after you complete all forms.)

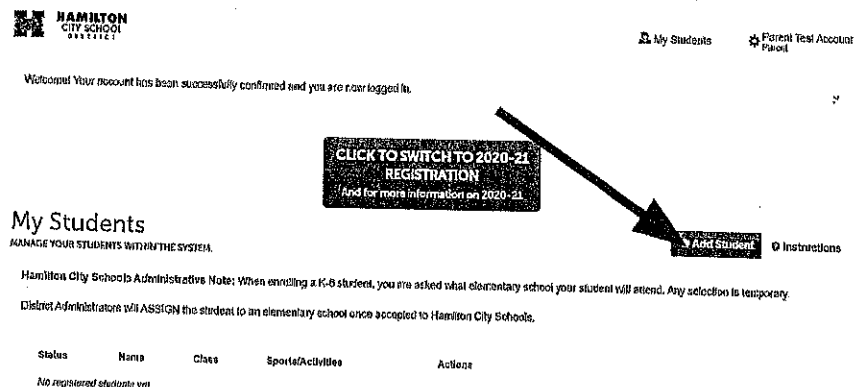
Notes for Student-Athletes

- Important:** If your child is a student-athlete, you will need to get your student re-evaluated by a doctor periodically according to school policy. Automatic emails will be sent to you when your student's Physical is within 60, 30, 15, 5 days of expiring.
- Tip:** You may add/renew sports at any time before registration deadlines, though you and your student will both be required to look over and reconfirm that all information in your forms is still correct. (Some sports may have additional forms.)

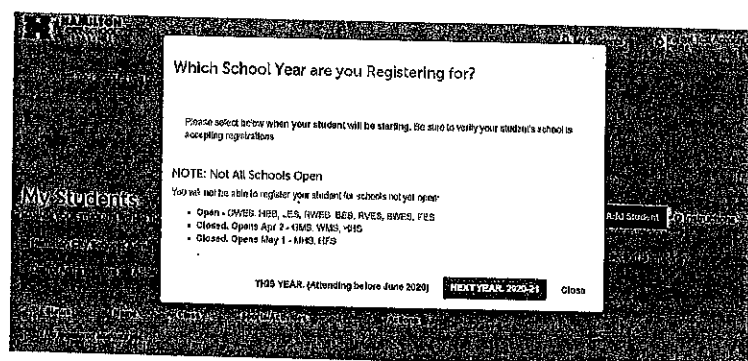

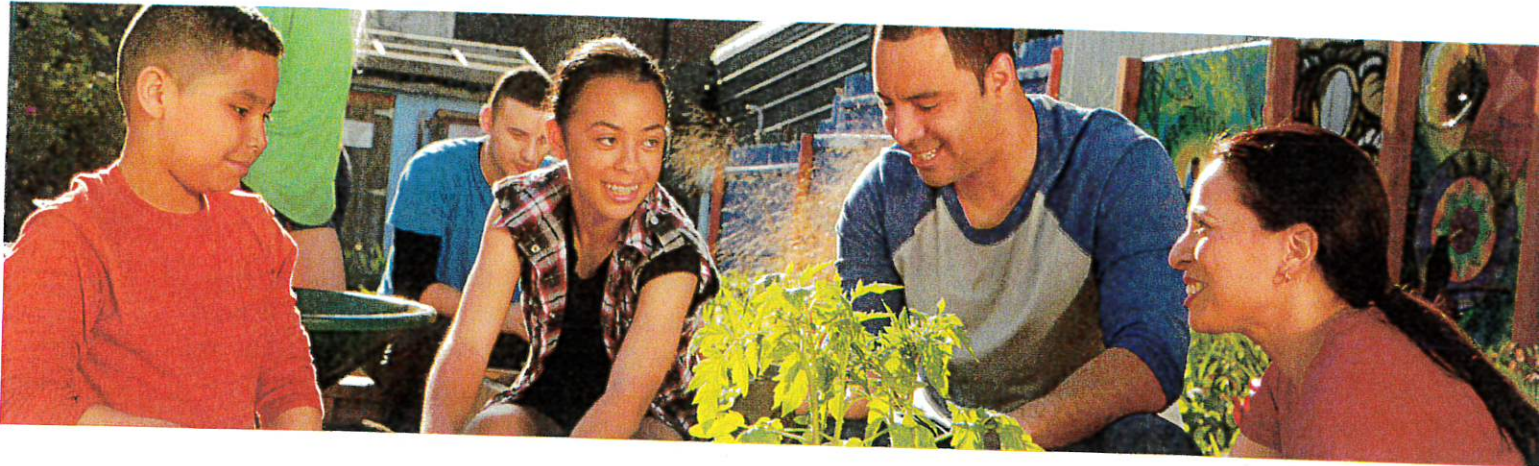

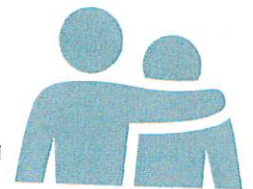

Talking to Kids About Alcohol and Other Drugs: 5 Conversation Goals

Research suggests that one of the most important factors in healthy child development is a strong, open relationship with a parent. It is important to start talking to your children about alcohol and other drugs before they are exposed to them—as early as 9 years old.

Young people are more likely to listen when they know you're on their side. Reinforce why you don't want your child to drink or use other drugs—because you want your child to be happy and safe. The conversation will go a lot better if you're open and you show concern.



1 Show you disapprove of underage drinking and other drug misuse.

Over 80 percent of young people ages 10–18 say their parents are the leading influence on their decision whether to drink. Send a clear and strong message that you disapprove of underage drinking and use or misuse of other drugs.

3 Show you're a good source of information about alcohol and other drugs.

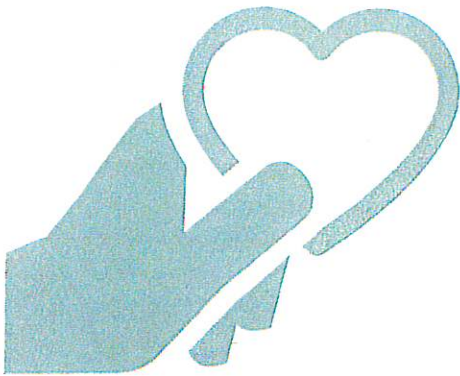
You want your child to make informed decisions about alcohol and other drugs with reliable information about its dangers. You don't want your child to learn about alcohol and other drugs from unreliable sources. Establish yourself as a trustworthy source of information.

2 Show you care about your child's health, wellness, and success.

Show you're paying attention and you'll discourage risky behaviors.

Show you're aware of what your child is up to, as young people are more likely to drink or use other drugs if they think no one will notice. Do this in a subtle way, without prying.

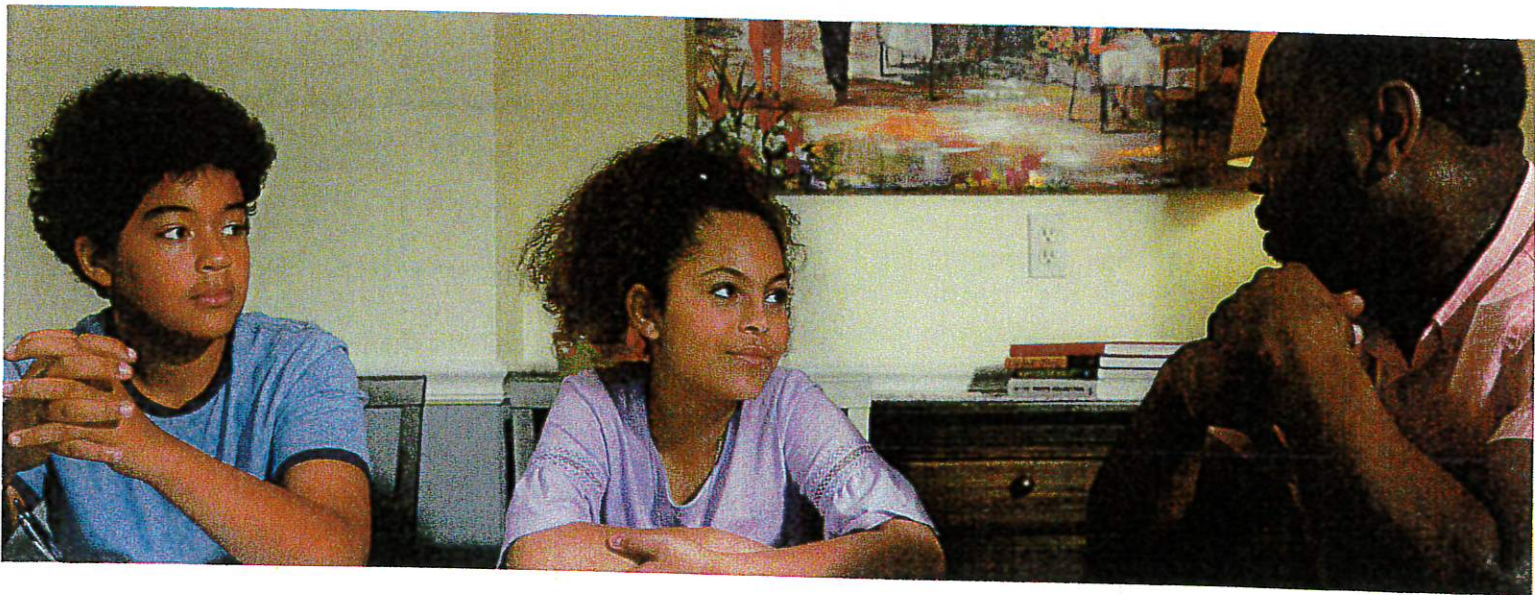

Build your child's skills and strategies for avoiding drinking and drug use.

Even if you don't think your child wants to drink or try other drugs, peer pressure is a powerful thing. Having a plan to avoid alcohol and drug use can help children make better choices. Talk with your child about what they would do if faced with a decision about alcohol and drugs, such as texting a code word to a family member or practicing how they'll say "no thanks."

Keep it low-key. Don't worry, you don't have to get everything across in one talk. Plan to have many short talks.

MEASLES BREAKING NEWS...

An ongoing **measles outbreak** has sickened over 80 children around Columbus, Ohio. The outbreak began in **early November, 2022** with four children who had no history of travel. As of the end of December, 29 children have been hospitalized. No deaths have been reported. Most cases are children between the ages of 1 and 2, and none have been fully vaccinated against measles.

Pediatricians and parents should make sure that children are up to date on all childhood vaccines.

WHAT IS MEASLES?

Measles is a viral infection usually occurring in children. Measles used to be quite common, but the introduction of vaccine virtually eliminated the disease from the United States. Measles, also called rubeola, is one of the most infectious diseases known and can cause serious illness and death in small children.

Measles complications. – inflammation of the brain, pneumonia, blindness, permanent brain damage.

Symptoms:

Measles symptoms begin roughly 10 days after infection with the virus. Measles starts with high fever, runny nose, cough, and red eyes. A distinctive rash appears 3 to 5 days after the first symptoms. It begins with flat red spots that appear on the face near the hairline spreading downward to the neck, arms, trunk, legs, and feet. Small raised bumps may also appear on the top of the flat red spots.

2-3 days after symptoms begin: Tiny white spots (Koplik spots) may appear inside the mouth



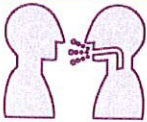
Rash appears 3-5 days after symptoms begin

Transmission



Measles spreads from the nose and respiratory tract of an infected person. Coughing, sneezing, and even breathing can spread the virus.



The virus can live is transmitted through the air by microscopic droplets and sometimes by direct contact or contact with contaminated surfaces.

HOW TO PREVENT MEASLES?



Measles can be prevented with the MMR vaccine (measles, mumps, and rubella). Children generally receive the first dose between 12-15 months of age. Measles vaccine may be recommended in children as young as 6 months old in outbreak situations. Immunoglobulin may be recommended if a child is unable to receive the vaccine.

Diagnosis:

Usually, healthcare providers will recognize the rash and symptoms to diagnose measles. Laboratory tests can confirm measles.

Treatment:

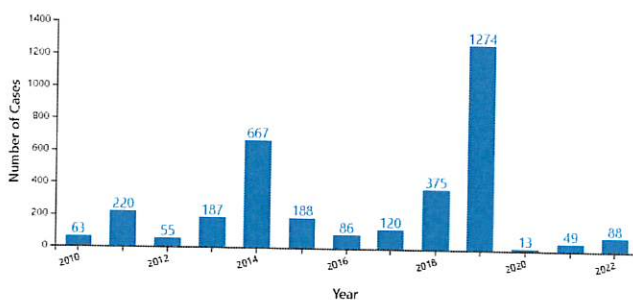
There is no specific treatment for measles, but supportive care can help children who are more severely ill. Illness usually takes about 10-14 days to resolve. Give acetaminophen or ibuprofen for fever and discomfort, along with plenty of fluids and plenty of rest. Vitamin A is recommended for children who may have nutritional deficiency or are hospitalized with measles

MEASLES CASES AND OUTBREAKS

As of December 22th, 2022, a total of **117 measles** cases have been reported in 5 jurisdictions (refers to any of the 50 states, New York City, and the District of Columbia).

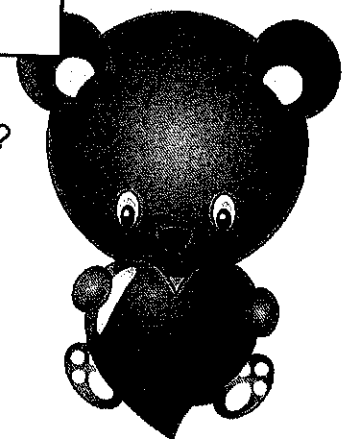

Driver's Education Classes for 2023

There will be **NO CLASSROOM PHASE** this year for Driver's Education classes, all will be done **ONLINE**.

Each student will be required to complete the **ONLINE instruction on their own**. Once you have registered and paid the fee, you will be given further instructions for the **ONLINE class**. The instructor will determine the driving phase.

The class will be limited to the first 40 students who register for the program. Registration will conclude on **Friday, March 31st, 2023**.

The State of Nebraska mandates that the students must be 14 years and 2 months of age to get a Learner's Permit and must have a permit (LPE, LPD, SCP), by the time they begin driving on public roadways while learning to drive. This includes class driving.

As of January 1, 2013, the Department of Motor Vehicles began processing School Permit/Provisional Operator's Permit waivers electronically. All students are being **REQUIRED** to have a school or learner's permit prior to the Driver Safety Course. You must present your school/learner's permit to the instructor.

Once your student has successfully completed the course, they will be given a card with the necessary information for the student to process their application on line.

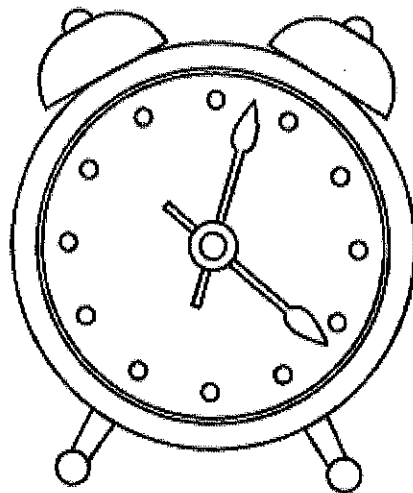
1. Applicants must be at least 14 years and two months old, but younger than 16 years and three months to be issued a School Permit (SCP). The SCP expires when the individual is 16 years and three months of age.
2. No Provisional Operator's Permit (POP) can be issued until such person:
 - A. Has possessed a Learner's Permit (LPD) for at least six months (a School Learner's Permit (LPE) and School Permit (SCP) will also be accepted to meet this requirement; and
 - B. Has not accumulated three or more points on their driving record during the six month period immediately preceding the POP application date.
3. During the first six months of the POP, the holder can only operate a motor vehicle with no more than one passenger who is not an immediate family member and who is under nineteen years of age.
4. Individuals presenting a **50 Hour Certification** form when applying for a POP must also indicate that at least 10 hours of motor vehicle operation was between sunset and sunrise.
5. The holder of an LPE, SCP, LPD or POP shall not use any type of interactive wireless communication device while operating a motor vehicle. Interactive wireless communication device means any wireless electronic communication between two or more parties, including, but not limited to, a mobile or cellular phone, a text messaging device, or a personal digital assistant that sends or receives messages, an audio-video player that sends or receives messages, or a laptop computer.
6. Enforcement of the hours of operation and passenger limitation for POP holders and no use of a wireless device while operating a motor vehicle for LPE, SCP, LPD and POP holders is a secondary action when the permit holders have been cited or charged with a violation of some other law.
